The world's influence/power processes are moving beyond the nation-state as the unit of analysis.

Re models of international power: An alternative to the <u>Forbes</u> list - and probably more useful as a focused list of constructive leadership for international issues - is the Trilateral Commission lists. Yes, it still exists - and as it has lowered its profile it actually has expanded and developed much stronger regional elements.

The Website is www.trilateral.org. The current North American Chairman is Joseph Nye at Harvard, who used to direct the National Intelligence Council.

I would not recommend a formal & published US government list of the world's most constructive/influential private citizens (although it could be part of the database used for the World Social Capital Report).

However, if Admiral Blair is thinking about global power and influence, this kind of database [with expansions] does need to one of the analysis tools used by the National Intelligence Council/DNI
